Discussing ethnic conflict regulation through powersharing arrangements, postwar state-building in ethnically divided states, constitutional design, electoral institutions in Lebanon

PROFILE

Dr. Saleh Machnouk is an Academic Visitor to St Antony's College, Oxford University. His research focuses mainly on ethnic conflict regulation through power-sharing arrangements, postwar state-building in ethnically divided states, constitutional design, electoral institutions, and third-party intervention in civil wars. Dr. Machnouk is currently finishing his first book, provisionally titled War After War: Explaining the Resurgence of Ethnic Violence After Power-Sharing, which comparatively assesses the postwar and power-sharing experiences of four ethnically divided countries, Lebanon, Bosnia, Northern Ireland and Iraq. It unpacks why ethnic violence re-emerges in some cases but not in others by jointly assessing three interdependent levels of analysis: the political system, the regional environment, and the role of foreign guarantors after conflict. His previous research on power-sharing and electoral design in ethnically divided states has appeared in journals such as Ethnopolitics. He has taught Political Science and International Relations at the University of Cambridge and the Lebanese American University. He also writes a regular opinion column for a general audience in the Lebanese daily newspaper Annahar. Dr. Machnouk holds a PhD in Politics and International Studies from the University of Cambridge, a Master in Public Policy from Harvard University, and an MA in Middle Eastern Studies as well as a BA in Political Studies and Public Administration from the American University of Beirut.
